Learning Project - Under the Sea

Class - Year One

Weekly Reading Tasks	Weekly Phonics Tasks
<p>Monday- Ask your child to make a sea-themed bookmark. They could take inspiration from 'Sharing a Shell' or 'The Snail and the Whale'.</p>	<p>Monday- Go on a sound hunt with your child around the house/garden. They can list all of the items they can find containing the sounds from this week's spellings. They may identify objects that contain an alternative way of spelling the sound, for example; ea/ee/e-e/y.</p>
<p>Tuesday- Read each of your spelling words, explain what they mean or look up what they mean here and read it to a grown up.</p>	<p>Tuesday- Make a rhyming list. Start with an 'Under the sea' themed word and see how many more you can add. Eg - sea, pea, flea, bee, knee, tree, me, tea, Lee, free, wee! Who can think of the most and make the longest list?</p>
<p>Wednesday- Your child could read a story/poem/nursery rhyme to another family member. This could be to a younger sibling before bedtime or they may wish to Facetime a relative (with adult supervision of course).</p>	<p>Wednesday- Your child could visit Phonics Play and play Buried Treasure.</p>
<p>Thursday- Listen to and read along with 'Commotion in the Ocean' or 'Rainbow Fish'. Ask your child questions about the characters or story. Can they answer inference questions (How? Why?) Can they think of an alternative ending?</p>	<p>Thursday- Ask your child to write the alphabet using capital letters. Challenge your child to write the lowercase letters too.</p>
<p>Friday- Can your child retell one of the stories from this week orally? Can you talk about what happens in the story? Can you retell the story in sequence? Encourage your child to retell by drawing a comic strip. Is there a clear beginning, middle and end?</p>	<p>Friday- Pick a phonic sound or blend and show it to your child. Encourage them to think of as many words containing that sound as they can. Can they segment the word and write it down? For example, you show 'ai' and your child thinks of 'wait' and writes it down. Encourage sounding using the blend 'w-ai-t', not 'w-a-i-t'.</p>
Weekly Writing Tasks	Weekly Maths Tasks - Time
<p>Monday- Visit a desert island here. Ask your child to write a message in a bottle. What can they see, hear, feel, taste and smell? Why not roll the message up and pop it in a plastic bottle?</p>	<p>Monday- Write the days of the week on paper and cut them up into cards. Take turns turning over the cards. If, when you turn the card, you have a day that is before or after the day shown you can say snap.</p>
<p>Tuesday- Encourage your child to write each of their spelling words in a sentence. Don't forget capital letters and full stops.</p>	<p>Tuesday- With your child, list different activities/chores they have to do throughout the day. Can they order them after making the list? Can your child sort them into the times of day each thing happens in (e.g. morning, afternoon, night etc)?</p>
<p>Wednesday- Practise writing your spellings in your neatest writing, thinking about talls, smalls and tails. Are the letters the correct size in relation to one another? Are the letters sitting on the line correctly?</p>	<p>Wednesday- Write the months of the year on separate pieces of paper and mix them up. Can your child order them correctly?</p>

Thursday-Write a character profile about a sea creature from '[Commotion in the Ocean](#)' or '[Rainbow Fish](#)'. Encourage your child to use headings such as: - appearance, behaviour, likes, dislikes, etc.

Thursday- Using a clock in your house practise telling the time with your child to the nearest hour, half hour, 15 minute intervals.

Friday- Write a character profile about a sea creature that you have invented yourself. Use the same headings as yesterday. Can you write an adventure for your sea creature to go on? Is it a goodie or a baddie?

Friday- Try some time word problems or challenges. For example, 'If I start to watch a TV programme at 3 o'clock and it is on for 1 hour, what time would it be over?' or 'If your birthday is in April and mine is 2 months later, when is my birthday?'

TOPIC TASKS - To be completed through the week

Our learning this week is based around the theme of UNDER THE SEA. Here are some tasks to try.

- **Guess Who?** - Ask your child to write fact cards about animals from under the sea. They can use books or websites to find out about the appearance, habitat and diet of each creature. After this, play a game of 'Guess Who?' using the cards and yes/no questions.
- **Put Your Goggles On**- Your child can visit [this website](#) and watch a live stream of a tropical reef. Whilst watching, ask them to sketch all of the animals that they can see. Remind them to look at the shapes and patterns on each creature and to include these in their sketches.
- **Junk Modelling**- Using junk or recycling materials from around the home, ask your child to design and make a Sea Turtle. Your child may wish to make another sea creature after this.

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Create a poster to say thank you to God for our seas, oceans and all of the living things within them. You could draw some of your favourite sea life creatures and write some words and sentences to share what you like about God's creations.
